

## Felsted Friendship Club

In February, our meeting was split two ways. The first speaker was Chris Chippendale from LPA Made Simple whose firm is linked to London Age UK. He came to speak to us on the benefits of having a Lasting Power of Attorney set up before it is too late. The two types are for Health and Welfare and for Property and Financial Affairs. These documents have to be registered before they can be used, when someone becomes mentally incapacitated. Without both documents, one might not receive the care one would like and our monies and assets might not be controlled by the people one would prefer i.e. family and/or trusted friends.

In the second half of the meeting, Tony Cramphorn, Chairman of the local Abbeyfield Society came to talk to us on its history. Begun in 1955 by Richard Carr-Gorm the Society eventually had 400 homes ranging over 7 countries. Some homes provide extra care, others independent living in flats or a sheltered house with a housekeeper providing three meals a day. All give companionship, support and a caring atmosphere. Tony was accompanied by Cass Murray, the Manager of the 14-bed home in Felsted and Diane Fitzgerald who gave us the facts and figures of the Abbeyfields in the area. An Abbeyfield Village has been built in Braintree, called Polly's Field, where one can buy a one- or two- bedroomed flat or part purchase. It offers a range of leisure facilities.

March found us at Felsted School where we had been invited for tea and music. A very special tea and a wonderful piano recital from a student called Kaleigh, who will be off to the Royal Academy of Music later in the year.

At our April meeting, Evelyn Woodley our President said Grace before our fish and chip lunch. Then came our AGM. Barbara Burnham stepped down from the Committee and Alison thanked her for all she had done. The following members were elected to the Committee, Alison Moore (Chairman), Sue King (Vice-Chairman), Carole Smith (Treasurer), Christine Robinson (Membership and Minute Secretary), Joyce White (Programme Secretary), Diane Denney (Catering), Marian Martin and Rita Staines. Alison welcomed Anne Segal onto the Committee. The entertainment afterwards was provided by Siobhan Pierce with more adventures of Dolly Daydream. She gave us some lighthearted as well as some serious moments

## Neighbourhood Plan Review

The review of the Neighbourhood Plan is progressing well. Thanks to all who attended the drop-in sessions in March and who contributed to the discussions about how we should try to control development in the parish and allocate sites for the 84 new homes that the draft Uttlesford District Council (UDC) Local Plan tells us we must accept between now and 2041. We also asked where, should it become necessary, the shop and post office could be best relocated.

We have got the message! We are concerned about the vibrancy of the village centre. We feel surrounded and exploited. None of us wants any more development but we must accommodate the 84 that the draft UDC Local Plan allocates.

We also know our current Neighbourhood Plan is working. The applications for 50 more homes at Hartford End and a proposed new traveller site in Chelmsford Road have both recently been refused following objections from the parish with both refusals referencing conflict with policies in the current Felsted Neighbourhood Plan. By reviewing and updating our plan, we can try to ensure that any development has the least negative impact and offers something positive to the community. That's why we are conducting a review.

Minutes of our meetings and other important documents, like the result of the Housing Needs Survey, are on the parish website.

We are looking to recruit a small team of volunteers to help check & sort donations and support families when we are open, making up clothing bundles etc.



## Felsted Royal British Legion - A History

Felsted Branch of the Royal British Legion will be 100 years old on 2 December 2024.

On 24 February 1924 Felsted Memorial Hall and war memorial were opened by the High Sheriff of Essex, Major Guy Gilbey Gold. At that time, it was decided that a local branch of the British Legion should be formed and in December 1924, three years after the formation of the British Legion, the branch came into being with the following officers being elected, namely President, Rev Moffatt Chairman, Colonel Phillot, Secretary W Smith, Treasurer A Holmes.

In October 1924 and for the next 10 years the newly formed branch held their meetings in the recently opened Memorial Hall.

In 1933 in the will of Mrs Ada Trow, the land opposite the Parish Church in Bury Chase was offered to the Roman Catholic Bishop of Brentwood with the proviso that if they declined the offer, it was to be left to the British Legion in memory of Mrs Trow's son Capt Francis Ferres–Moorat who died in the First World War.

The Bishop of Brentwood renounced and disclaimed any rights to the land. In 1934, permission was granted to place a hut on the land opposite the Parish Church donated by Mrs Trow.

The British Legion paid to the estate of Mrs Trow's husband the sum of £200 for the land in 1956. It then officially become the property of the British Legion however, Mrs Trow did specifically state that as long as there was a local Branch of the British Legion in Felsted the land and premises could not be sold. Over the years several additions and alterations to the property have been made particularly in the 1970s, when a new bar, kitchen and snooker room were added by the club.

The first annual general meeting of the British Legion was held in January 1926, the total membership at that time was 63, today the membership stands at over 300.

## Felsted Royal British Legion - A history

In 1946 the ladies of the village started the women's section, although ladies from the village met during the Second World War years to serve refreshments from the Bury Chase site to soldiers who were billeted in Felsted school. The women's section closed in 2019.

In 1971 the British Legion became the Royal British Legion, their main aim is still to help ex-service members and their families in times of need. If anyone knows of anyone who could benefit from the Legions help then please get in touch with us in Bury Chase.

As stated previously, the land that the British Legion stands on was donated my Mrs Ada Trow in memory of her son Captain Frances Ferrers Moorat.

Captain Ferres Moorat was educated at Felsted School, although he had been hopitalised with Trench Fever he specially requested that he might be allowed to return to his regiment to lead his men once more. He died of his wounds on the 23 August 1918 after leading his men in a most successful battle. He is buried in the Military Cemetery at Bienviller, France

## **Felsted Records**



Felsted Records was the name of two record labels. the British version beginning in July 1954 as a subsidiary of Decca Records. Leasing music from the jazz and dance band genres - from the French Blue Star, Riviera, and Classique labels - it took its name from our village, where Sir Edward Lewis (head of Decca), lived. The label's release of note was 'Smokie' by Bill Black. Black was connected to rock'n'roll royalty, having been bassist for none other than Elvis Presley!

In 1957, Felsted Records US opened, operating from London Records' office in New York. Marketed as a pop label, it released songs by Jimmy Wisner, as well as The Flares. Their 'Foot Stompin' Part 1' of 1961 reached #20 on the Black Singles chart and #25 on the Billboard Hot 100. Felsted US had some other success with Kathy Linden who had some minor hits.





The Felsted Records label was orange with black printing (pictured). The 'F' in Felsted formed the inside of a musical note, with a black record tonearm under the logo



## Felsted Records



Sadly, neither label had much commercial success. London Records closed the UK label in 1964 and its roster was transferred. At the end of the sixties, CBS was the top record label, followed by Warner Brothers, RCA Victor and Capitol Records, which were all very popular. By the 70s, there came more modern labels like EMI and Curb Records.

Of the major labels, there are just three still remaining, who now own most subsidiary record labels - those like Felsted Records - Sony, Universal and Warner. Columbia Records - the second 'record label' documented to exist - is still in operation today!

## **Recipe: Shortbread**

Shortbread makes a lovely addition to an afternoon tea and can be made a day or two before required. Store it in an airtight container.

Semolina or ground rice is recommended to create a crunchier texture, but can be substituted with more (3oz/75g) plain flour.

## Ingredients

6oz/175g plain flour

6oz/175g butter (at room temperature)

3oz / 75g caster sugar

3oz / 75g semolina or ground rice

Additional sugar for dusting

### **Instructions**

- 1. Grease a 8" (20cm) loose bottom tin a fluted tin gives a pretty edge.
- 2. Beat the butter to soften it, then add the remaining ingredients. Mix together using a spoon or food mixer. Finish off with your hands creating a ball of dough.
- 3. Using a rolling pin, roll the dough on a flat surface into a round, then transfer to the tin. Alternatively, you can bake on parchment paper placed on a baking tray
- 4. Push dough into the edges of the tin and give it a final roll with a glass tumbler.
- 5. Prick the shortbread all over with a fork.
- 6. Bake for 35 minutes at  $160^{\circ}$ C/ $140^{\circ}$ C fan oven/ Gas mark 3.
- 7. After removing from the oven, dust with additional caster sugar immediately and using a palette knife mark the surface of the shortbread into 12 wedges.
- 8. Leave to cool in the tin, then remove the rim of the tin and cut the shortbread into wedges.

### **Going Green**

The parish council (PC) has received a grant from Uttlesford District Council's Zero Carbon Community Fund which will be used to create three small wildflower meadows on Bannister Green, Watch House Green and Willows Green The meadows will be sown in the Autumn and it is hoped that they will put on a beautiful display in 2025. The grant will also fund the purchase and installation of various habitat boxes around the parish. The PC is looking forward to increasing biodiversity in the parish.

### Tree damage

The parish councillors were saddened to learn that the recently planted trees on Bannister Green were vandalised. We all benefit from established trees being in our environment, they purify our air which helps to combat climate change. They provide shade in the summer and help protect us from flooding as their leaves capture the water and their roots absorb it. It is really important that the PC plants as many trees as possible so that future generations can benefit from them and enjoy their beauty.

We have our annual Sports Week coming up soon, which includes an afternoon of races and activities for parents to come along to.




## **Felsted Primary School**

## Felsted School-Press Release



## Felsted is in the Top 20 UK International Baccalaureate Schools

Exceptional International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma scores achieved by sixth formers at Felsted School in north Essex in 2023 have resulted in the school being named in the top 20 for IB in the country.



Rankings are published by IB-School.eu and Best-Schools.co.uk, which take into account scores achieved by IB Diploma candidates around the world.

There was a 100% IB pass rate at Felsted in 2023, and nearly a third of Felsted's IB candidates achieved a world-class score of 40 points or more out of a possible 45, which is equivalent to four A\*s at A Level. 63% achieved more than 35 points, equivalent to two A\*s and one A at A Level. The scores of all Felsted candidates exceeded the global and UK averages: Felsted candidates averaged 36.2 points, while the global average is 30.2 and the UK average is 34.6.

Scoring a remarkable 43 out of 45 points, Felsted's top two IB achievers in 2023 were Alexandra Carson and Lukas Wacker. ## Planning ahead

Most residents may not recall that I was appointed a UDC Cabinet Member soon after being first elected as District Councillor in 2019. I was reappointed to Cabinet after re-election in 2023 and my Cabinet responsibilities are Planning Policy which includes the making and bringing into effect of a Local Plan. That is a full-on activity which involves a great deal of materials to review and take into account, as well as attending very frequent meetings within and outside the Council.

UDC's current Local Plan is nearly 19.5 years old – it was made in January 2005, so it is hopelessly out of date and in fact recent National Policies have superceded it extensively. It is because of this that we have an absence of effective planning policies currently and as a result, have experienced on our doorsteps in the parish (but actually also right across the district) ad hoc developments which have been pursued by speculative and opportunistic land owners and promoters acting on their behalf.

A Local Plan sets the long-term policy vision for the development across the district of housing, employment locations and the insfrastructure needed as a result over a period of 20 years (to 2041). The process of making a new Local Plan is well on the way now following the last set of consultations (Regulation 18) which so many of you participated in, ending in November 2023. Thanks to those who responded.

Everyone's representations are being taken into account and I hope fellow UDC Councillors will approve a revised version to be brought before them in July. There has been cross-party membership of groups and panels considering the merits and input from them has been provided as we have been going along. If approved, residents will have a second opportunity to comment and make submissions on that draft (Regulation 19), which will then be reviewed in a full blown hearing conducted independently by the Planning Inspectorate at some point in 2025. Those hearings are formal and will be attended by representatives of Town and Parish Councils, residents, plus land owners/promoters and several important third parties like Historic England, Natural England, Essex County Council etc.

Local Plan making is in some ways a thankless task as it will not please nor satisfy the competing interests and concerns of all

residents let alone the commercial interests of some land owners and developers. However, it is a vital and very responsible exercise and the community continues to have a very important role to play throughout including at the next stage. The entire timetable that we have set ourselves is a challenge - we are working at pace not only for the benefit of the community but also because the Government wants to see a Local Plan made with the least delay, and so we have to keep them abreast of our work progress.

I wanted you to know that your views later this Summer/beginning of the Autumn at the Regulation 19 stage will still be wanted as they shall be of great value since they are sent to, and taken into account by, the Planning Inspectorate. Further, if anyone wanted to speak at the hearings, they would need to make written representations to qualify for the opportunity to do so.

The date of the next round of consultations is unknown since Councillor colleagues will have to decide if they agree with the next draft plan version. If they do, then the consultation will run over 8 weeks from the end of July through into September – we would be allowing more time than is required by the Regulations to take into account intervening summer holidays etc.

I will write again during the Summer bringing you up to date as things move along. One bit of information I would like to anticipate now is that UDC plans to introduce, alongside a new Local Plan, a Community Infrastructure Levy which will impose an improved and more extensive obligation on developers to contribute to the costs and provision of infrastructure. This would lead to a great financial injection into community benefits being superior to the current arrangements of 'section 106' contributions which many residents will have heard of. I believe that this will prove to be a further example of long-term improvements achieved in my area of Cabinet responsibility. Additionally, these benefits can also be applied in the context of Neighbourhood Plans and I commend Felsted Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group for the good work that they recently embarked on in this respect.


## Dunmow Art Group prepares to launch 2<sup>nd</sup> N W Essex Open Studios Trail

## The Hundred Parishes

The Hundred Parishes includes much of the extensive barley-growing area of the Hertfordshire and Essex borders. The malting of barley in preparation for its use in the brewing industry was a significant activity in several of our larger villages and market towns, especially along the River Stort, from the 18th to the 20th centuries.

Evidence is still to be found in the form of place names indicating the location of former maltings, such as Malting(s) Lane in Much Hadham and Chrishall; and in the names of buildings that were once maltings or associated with one nearby. Thus there are a number of Malting(s) Cottage(s), as in Linton, Bartlow, Much Hadham, Aspenden and Ugley; and Old Maltings as at Manuden, Arkesden and Great Chesterford. In Little Hallingbury there is Malting Farm and The Old Brick Malting.

As well as conversion to private houses, surviving maltings have been renovated and converted to a variety of uses. Great Dunmow's is now a museum and community resource. In Wethersfield the maltings is now the village hall and shop, while the station maltings in Newport and those in Central Arcade in Saffron Walden are commercial premises. Multi-storey maltings in Sheering have been converted into apartments and in Stanstead Abbotts to a business centre.

The classic form of a malting reflects the various processes which took place within the building. Grain was hauled in through the lucam or hoist housing at one end of the building where it was then steeped in water to start the germination process. The grain was laid out on germination floors before growth was halted at a particular stage by applying heat in the kiln at the other end of the building. The process of initiating and then halting germination is known as malting.
