Recipe: Pear and Celeriac Soup

You can use your windfall and bruised pears in this recipe, it is a savoury soup with the subtle taste of pear.

Ingredients

olive oil
1 onion finely chopped
2 cloves garlic, finely chopped
1 thumb-sized piece ginger, finely chopped
1 celeriac, peeled and roughly chopped
4 ripe pears, cored and roughly chopped
1 litre vegetable stock
salt and pepper to taste

Optional:a handful of parsley or chives finely chopped

Method

Heat 1 tbsp oil in a large saucepan, add the onion, garlic and ginger and cook over a medium heat for about 5 minutes until softened but not coloured.

Add the celeriac, pears and stock, bring to the boil, then reduce to a simmer and simmer for 20-30 minutes or until the celeriac has softened. Liquidise the soup until smooth. Season and serve sprinkled with parsley or chives.

Treasure Hunt: The hobby for everyone!

If you've not heard of this international phenomenon already, 'geocaching' is a real-world, outdoor adventure that is happening all the time, all around the world. All that it takes to join the hunt is the Geocaching app (or a GPS device to navigate) and you're on your way!

What might you find? Well, caches are cleverly hidden containers of different sizes. Sometimes they involve solving a puzzle or riddle; they can be tiny, with just a logbook that you sign to prove you found it - or they might be much bigger and hold items to trade. The idea is that if you take something from a cache, you leave in its place another piece of 'treasure' of equal or greater value, so that the game continues. You might discover or choose to leave trinkets, stickers, small toys and such like - just don't cache anything that can spoil!

There are millions of geocaches in 190 countries waiting to be discovered — in fact, there are some near you right now! There are at least 30 hidden within the parish. This map shows just a few of the geocaches waiting to be found in Felsted, but there are thousands more to find locally. There is a series along the Flitch Way, and a handful at the Gt Notley Discovery Centre and many, many more beyond.

Geocaching is a great way to discover places that you would not otherwise stumble across. It can also an excellent education tool and an excuse to get off the sofa now that the summer has drawn to an end!

Local Plan - the latest:

Our Elections: Some residents have asked why in our Election in July did we vote in a different Parliamentary Constituency than before? In our ward of Felsted and Stebbing, we of course voted in the Braintree Constituency for the first time - does that have a knock-on effect for other elections? The answer is no. Every four years we will continue to vote, as before, in Uttlesford District Council elections returning two members (currently, me elected in 2019 and Councillor Richard Silcock elected in 2023) and also in an Essex County Council Election (currently, Councillor Martin Foley) representing our Division (running from Hempstead in the high north to Hartford End). In the next County Election, due in May 2025, we will be joined into the Great Dunmow Division for the first time, so we will then no longer be respresented by a member covering a largely rural area. These changes come about not because of any political decision, but come about because of population increases and we are not the only parishes affected; for the last parliamentary elections, electors in Hatfield Broad Oak, Hatfield Heath and the Hallingburys have been "moved", in their case, into Harlow.

Local Plan - the latest:

I said that I would update residents as to the latest state of play. I am glad to report that Uttlesford's Regulation 19 Local Plan was approved on 30 July at Full Council to enable it to proceed to a consultation which will run for 8 weeks until 3 October. After this, the Plan with supporting evidence base (running to thousands of pages) together with the responses made in the next consultation, will be submitted to the Planning Inspectorate. They will review everything in an Examination in Public, and after hearing further representations, will decide if the plan is "sound" ie: complies with the legal requirements and meets both the housing requirements as set by the Government and also the employment needs for the District until 2041. Then, possibly containing recommended modifications, it will come back to Council to adopt. Hopefully, this will happen during 2025 so that it can be adopted after with the least possible delay.

UDC's current Local Plan is nearly 20 years old – it was made in January 2005, so it is hopelessly out of date and in fact recent National Policies have superceded it extensively. It is because of this that we have a dearth of effective planning policies and as a

result, have experienced ad hoc developments pursued by speculative and opportunistic land owners and promoters. In fact, 8,614 dwellings have obtained planning consent since 2021 across the District and we have seen the impact of this on our own parish door step.

So, the importance of having an up to date Local Plan cannot be overstated; the district desperately needs to take control of its development future rather than have it come about by happenstance. However, by coincidence, on the same day the council voted to approve the Plan to go forward, the new government announced its intention to make substantial changes to its "housing numbers", National Planning Policy and to make these changes effective by the year end. As will be recalled, the Government's election manifesto anticipated substantial housing development to come.

At Council, unfortunately, all four LibDem members proposed an arbitrary blocking amendment to the draft plan (omitting some housing allocation in Takeley which would have led to redistribution elsewhere). Despite a strong warning that this unevidenced and last minute concept would lead to further delay and thus falling into the latest housing requirements of the Government, meaning an additional 11% housing allocation for our District, this proposed amendment was persisted in. Fortunately, it was defeated. However, on the main motion to proceed, the Conservatives (with two exceptions including the member for Flitch Green and Little Dunmow) and Lib Dems (with one exception - on this occasion that of Cllr Silcock) still opposed it. In the event, the draft was permitted to proceed by a majority vote of 24 in favour with 12 against. So, the process of making a new Local Plan has not been derailed, despite the very regrettable opposition just described. So, now residents may wish to respond to this final consultation stage, and the relevant link is at https://www.uttlesford.gov.uk/ rea-19-consultation.

Paper copies of the plan will be available to view at the district council's offices in Saffron Walden and at local libraries but the Parish Council will also be provided with a copy and a briefing to be able to assist members of the public.

If any resident has any questions or issues to raise on this piece (or of course any other unrelated subject), I will be very pleased to hear from them. I would also like to bring to everyone's attention a

monthly report which I have written every month since first elected in 2019. This is submitted to the Parish Council at their monthly meeting and then included in their Minutes as a link and contains a lot of information. If anyone would like their own personal copy, please shout!

Recent Government announcements and what it means for Felsted.

In his submission our District Councillor John Evans provides very useful details of UDC's current position regarding their emerging Local Plan.

Following the government announcement that John refers to we thought it would be helpful to expand on what he has said with specific details regarding the potential impacts on future housing in Felsted.

The Written Ministerial Statement (WMS), announcement of the Deputy Prime Minister, who is also the Secretary of State for Housing and Communities, will have a serious impact on many communities, like some of our neighbours. We are advised by UDC's Strategic Director of Planning that for example, Chelmsford has a 54% increase, Braintree a 35% and North Herts a 42% increase, which represent huge numbers of additional homes to be delivered by them.

The big question is, what effect could this announcement have on Felsted?

Fortunately as confirmed in the WMS, those District Councils that either have an "up to date" Local Plan or are at an advanced stage of developing a Local Plan (which UDC are classified to be, being at the Regulation 19 stage) will not have to accommodate the increase in housing numbers or apply the "yet to be formalised" revised yet to be formalised revised National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF)...

It is also the case that those communities with an "up to date" Neighbourhood Plan (as Felsted has) will have their Neighbourhood Plans respected.

Neighbourhood Plan Review

Without having an emerging Local Plan and current Neighbourhood Plan, the potential 11% increase in housing that John refers to resulting from the revised Government allocations and changes to the method of calculating local "housing need" in the revised NPPF would mean for Uttlesford, around 1500 additional dwellings.

So, whilst UDC has been historically neglectful in not updating the 2005 Local Plan sooner, we can be extremely grateful that the current advanced status of the new and emerging Regulation 19 Local Plan (coupled with Felsted having a Neighbourhood Plan less than 5 years old) will prove absolutely pivotal in protecting us from yet more unwanted and speculative development.

We know that many people feel that there is far too much house building going on around us (although the majority is either outside of Felsted Parish or had been approved before our Neighbourhood Plan was formally "Made" in 2020) but we can be thankful that UDC has an emerging Local Plan that is well advanced and that the Felsted Neighbourhood Plan is in place.

Following the reclassification by UDC in the Local Plan of certain "large villages" to "small villages" and the consequential redistribution of some housing, Felsted receives an allocation of 104 dwellings which we will need to support between now and 2041. Had the UDC Local Plan not been so well advanced and UDC had been given the 11% increase mentioned above and UDC distributed that increase across the District, Felsted could have anticipated a further increase to around 115 dwellings.

As John Evans says in his article, there are still bridges to cross; UDC's Local Plan must gain formal approval at the "Examination" stage, the authority needs to be able to demonstrate the required 5 Year Housing Land Supply and precisely when the revised NPPF will become law is unknown (anticipated around December 2024). But the current combined status of the UDC Local Plan and our Neighbourhood Plan have at least sheltered us from even more housing.

That's why we are working hard to review our Felsted NP to extend its period of added weight and influence.

The Hundred Parishes

The Hundred Parishes has an exceptional depth of ancient buildings. More than 6,000 are "listed", meaning that they appear on the National Heritage List for England. Each property listing includes a description and many of these descriptions take their text from the guide books produced by one exceptional man, Nikolaus Pevsner.

Pevsner, an architectural historian, was born in 1902 in Leipzig, Germany, the son of a Russian-Jewish fur merchant. In 1933 he moved to England and settled in Hampshire. Following the outbreak of World War II, he was taken to an internment camp but was released three months later.

Work on his series of architectural guide books, The Buildings of England, began in 1945. The edition covering the whole of Hertfordshire was published in 1953; Essex and Cambridgeshire followed in 1954.

Most of the ancient architecture in The Hundred Parishes is 12or in great detail. One example in Essex is Manuden, which he describes as follows: "Manuden has a specially pretty, short village street with timber framed cottages with oversailing upper floors near the church and a small assortment of Georgian houses a little further west".

In Cambridgeshire, he described the Norman interior of Ickleton's parish church as having few equals in the country.

In Hertfordshire, the 17th-century almshouses in Buntingford were described by Pevsner as "the stateliest almshouses in the county".

Nikolaus Pevsner was granted British citizenship in 1946, appointed CBE in 1953 and knighted in 1969 "for services to art and architecture". In total, he was responsible for 46 county-wide guides. He died in Hampstead, London in 1983.

The website www.hundredparishes.org.uk has more than a hundred walk routes that can be freely downloaded. The route descriptions draw attention to some of the listed buildings that are passed.
