Resting in Felsted

The problem with the diminishing capacity of the graveyard at Holy Cross in the village centre was recognised in 2020 in the Felsted Neighbourhood Plan, which established a policy to identify a new burial ground.

When in 2022 the Church announced that it could no longer accommodate further burials, some residents were naturally upset and concerned that their wish for a resting place in the parish might not be achievable.

Felsted Parish Council is very pleased to report that following discussions with the United Reformed Church, the burial ground in Chelmsford Road is available to parishioners of any denomination and has the capacity to meet the needs of our community for many decades.

Going forward, the parish will ultimately accept ownership and day-to-day management of the burial ground. The burial ground enjoys a wonderful rural setting, and the council will do all it can to protect and maintain its peace.

The parish would like to thank the United Reformed Church for its generous community spirit.

Recipe: Snickerdoodles

Traditionally these are cinnamon-coated cookies, but I add ground ginger to the batter at Christmas to give them a festive boost.

Ingredients

6oz / 175g unsalted butter 8oz / 225g light brown soft sugar 1 medium egg 1 tsp vanilla extract 10½ oz / 300g plain flour 1½ tsp cream of tartar 1 tsp bicarbonate of soda 1 tsp ground cinnamon ½ tsp sea salt

1 tsp ground ginger (optional addition at Christmas)

Coating

2oz / 50g granulated sugar 1 tsp ground cinnamon

Method

- 1. Mix the sugar and cinnamon together in a small bowl, leave to one side. (This is to coat the cookies).
- 2. Preheat oven to gas mark $6/200^{\circ}$ F/180°C fan and line 2-3 trays with greaseproof paper.
- 3. Mix the butter and sugar together until fluffy. Add the egg and vanilla and mix again until combined.
- 4. Add the plain flour, cream of tartar, bicarbonate of soda, sea salt and cinnamon to the batter and mix again.
- 5. Portion the cookies with desert spoon, roll into balls and roll into the sugar cinnamon mix and place on to a lined tray.
- 6. Bake for 11-13 minutes; allow cool before eating.

Felsted School wishes to thank all residents for their continued support (and patience) around the school whilst the road closure on Station Road was in effect.

Dogs on leads - dog walkers are requested to keep dogs on leads when using the public footpaths that run through Felsted School. The school would also like to remind residents that the school fields are not available for dog-walking by the general public.

Policing in the Parish - At their October meeting the PC were pleased to welcome PCSOs Natalie Smith and Mike O'Donnell-Smith who provided an update on local policing in the parish. It was noted that issues of concern are often discussed on social media yet fail to be officially reported to the police. The PCSOs stressed the need to report any issues of concern via 101 as only data gathered from official police reports can trigger their deployment.

Property Marking Kits - Essex Police are supporting farmers across the Uttlesford district by providing them with unique forensic property marking kits. The kits are free of charge with no ongoing costs and are delivered and demonstrated by the local community policing team. The kit can mark up to 50 items so once obtained users can mark items with the kit that is unique to them. Felsted – Conservation by Numbers

Uttlesford District Council area spreads across 64,118 hectares of Eastern England, or for those of you who prefer older measurements, a little over 158,000 acres or 10,000 football pitches!

The council's area is comprised of 60 parishes of which Felsted, with almost 6,000 acres, is one of the largest and oldest. (By contrast, our next-door neighbour, Flitch Green Parish, is the smallest and youngest parish in Uttlesford and is also the most densely populated in the district.)

Comprising just a little over 1% of the total area of the parish, the Conservation Area of circa 72 acres in the centre of the village represents the focus of our local heritage. However, it's not geographically in the centre of the 15 individual Greens and hamlets that comprise Felsted Parish.


The map opposite shows, in red, the boundaries of the Conservation Area which was first designated in 1977.

Within the Conservation Area there are 50 historic Listed Buildings grouped around the church and along Station Road, Chelmsford Road and Braintree Road. Of the 50 Listed Buildings/groups of buildings identified on the English Heritage list in the Conservation Area, 18% date from the 15th century or earlier; 20% from the 16th century; 30% from the 17th century; 12% from the 18th century and some 20% from the 19th and 20th centuries.

Two buildings are listed Grade I, the Church and the Old School Room and Lynch Gate. Five buildings are listed Grade II*: Boote House; property adjoining Boote House; The Pavilion; Ingram's Close and the Old School Masters House (Felsted Bookshop). Bury Farm Barn adjacent to the Conservation Area is also Grade II*. Elsewhere, the school and associated buildings of varying ages and architectural styles dominate the village.

It's not just the old, listed buildings that are important. Modern buildings of high quality, like Felsted School's Stewart House is recognised as a contemporary building of high-quality design that contributes to the area. Trees, hedgerows and open space are also very important and make a significant contribution to the general visual quality and importance of the Conservation Area.

Sunday School fire

On Saturday 24 November 1923 a fire broke out in the Congregational Church Sunday School building in Stebbing Road, and it was completely destroyed. There were a few minor injuries but thankfully no-one was killed.

The hall was being used for a production of 'Peggy O'Neil' by the May Hutchinson touring company. More than 200 people were in the hall at about 9pm when one

of three oil lamps being used as footlights fell and the spilled oil caught fire. Mr Harry Cloughton, a local farmer, threw his coat over the lamp, appealing to everyone to stay calm. He said later that had they listened to him there would have been no danger.

But the audience were 'greatly affrighted' and started to move towards the main door. In the confusion the other two lamps fell, and streams of oil burst into flame, igniting the stage and scenery immediately and filling the room with black smoke.

This caused people to rush forward and the crowd became wedged tight at the door - some being trampled on before they were pulled clear. It took Mrs Smith the caretaker a few minutes to reach and unlock a second door. Some people smashed windows at the other end of the hall and jumped to safety.

In an attempt to give some sense of calm Miss Ella Field, 'a bright little lady of 28', continued playing the piano until the auditorium was empty. By this time the flames had reached the piano.

Several people sustained burns, cuts and abrasions but miraculously the most severe injury seems to have been to a Mrs Hammond of Ford End who needed 5 stitches in a head wound.

The Felsted School fire brigade, aided by several hundred boys, their masters and the headmaster, fought the fire and prevented the flames reaching the Manse, the Congregational Church and the Almshouses. Mr Cloughton at considerable personal risk, broke down the door of a shed and rolled a 15-gallon drum of paraffin out of harm's way. Mr Overall had telephoned the Braintree fire brigade to assist. They set out but one of the shafts on their horse-drawn engine broke and they had to turn back.

The lath and plaster building, match-boarded inside, burnt very fiercely. It was about 50 years old and had just been renovated.

Sunday School fire

By 11 o'clock the building was down and everything inside it was lost, although a 'quarter of a peck' of copper coins was scraped up from the charred remains.

The damage was estimated at £400 which was covered by insurance, but the contents were not, and the loss to the theatrical company for scenery and clothing was £1,000.

The story was front page news in the national press and a number of regional newspapers from all over Britain and Ireland, with some very lurid headlines.

It emerged that the hall was unlicensed for stage plays, and the two managers of the Felsted Congregational School were summonsed to Braintree Petty Sessions. The court heard that the doors opened inwards, lamps were not fixed, chairs not battened together and there were no buckets of sand or water. The hall's capacity was 180 but over 220 were there. The defendants said the school had been licenced previously and they thought the licence was permanent. Felsted's Constable Carpenter had been to the school before the performance and was told they had a licence, but he had moved chairs that were blocking the doors. Both defendants were fined £5, the maximum penalty.

A week after the fire the Treasurer of the Congregational Church wrote to the Chelmsford Chronicle appealing for donations to build a new hall:

To the Editor

Sir, On behalf of the Trustees of Felsted Congregational Church, I beg to draw your readers' attention to the calamity that has befallen our Church Hall, which was totally destroyed by fire on Saturday evening last. We were in the habit of letting the hall for entertainments, this being the only available place in the village. The building had just been renovated, and the insurance is quite inadequate to build a new hall; therefore, we appeal to the generosity of the public for subscriptions ...



What could have been a disaster had a happy

ending. In November 1924 a handsome new brick building, now the United Reformed Church, opened on the same site. It cost £1,110. Full insurance had been paid and many generous gifts received.

Protecting green spaces

As part of the current Felsted Neighbourhood Plan review the Review Group is seeking one or two volunteers who would be prepared to join a small working group to identify areas of green space around the parish. The idea is that could be included in a list of 'designated green spaces' in the reviewed Felsted Neighbourhood Plan which would then be afforded an increased level of protection.

Green spaces can help to achieve social, economic and environmental benefits in the parish. They can be part of the public realm where informal social interaction takes place, provide pitches and facilities for sports supporting physical activity and recreation. They also form part of a network of paths and spaces, provide habitats for wildlife and natural corridors and spaces that form part of the character or setting of historic areas. Altogether these provide an attractive setting and outlook.

There are some fairly obvious areas that would qualify, such as the 33 acre nature area on Station Road, the allotments, the play area behind the Memorial Hall, Bannister Green etc. However there are undoubtedly many other areas around the Parish that could be formally assessed and potentially 'designated'.

Very specific issues need to be considered before an area can be 'designated', such as community amenity value, the contribution to local character and beauty, historic significance, recreational value, tranquillity, wildlife and other factors.

Ultimately, in order to qualify for 'designation' any identified area will need to meet certain criteria which are consistent with the National Planning Policy Framework.

DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' CORNER

Local Plan - the latest:

Consultations on the draft Local Plan for 2021-2041 have progressed to the final stage. Uttlesford District Council (UDC) is assembling the final set of representations and supporting reports to be submitted to the Planning Inspectorate, hopefully by the end of December 2024. 'Examination in Public' will then take place during 2025 according to a timetable set by the inspectorate. Winter Fuel Payment:

Many members of our community will have been very disappointed to learn of the Government's recent withdrawal of this payment for those over 66 years of age. The allowance is now only being offered to pensioners who receive means-tested benefit such as pension credit.

At their last meeting in October, UDC – across all party lines – considered that this was a matter of considerable regret and resolved to write to the Government, calling for the policy on linking Winter Fuel Payments to the receipt of Pension Credit to be suspended and for a new higher threshold determining eligibility to be set. We consider that the eligibility criteria is currently set far too low. Only those receiving a pension of less than £218.15 a week (£332.95 a week for couples) are eligible, lower than the living wage.

Currently there are 2,015 claims from pensioners living in the district who are in receipt of Housing Benefit and/or Local Council Tax Support and who previously would have qualified for a Winter Fuel Payment. Under the new rules the number automatically qualifying may drop to around 1,287. UDC considers it essential to raise awareness locally among potentially eligible residents concerning the 'triggering benefits' of Pension Credit to ensure people receive the support they are entitled to.

UDC is supportive of the work by Citizens Advice and Age UK to promote the Pension Credit scheme. Residents are encouraged to help others who might be likely to benefit but have difficulty in establishing contact directly with CA. DISTRICT COUNCILLORS' CORNER

The Government's announcement caused me to look into the heating statistics for Uttlesford further and in particular those for Felsted and Stebbing. I was concerned as to the potentially harsh consequence for residents who heat their homes 'off grid', ie by bulk oil or tank gas. Payment for these might be required in lump sums on delivery, rather than in instalments as for piped gas. In fact: 1% of households have no central heating; 54.6% are on mains gas; 23.6% are on oil only; 2.7% are on tank or bottled gas only; 0.3% use wood only and 1.3% use renewable energy only.

UDC was successful earlier this Summer in securing £3.8m from the Government to make council-owned properties more energy efficient. It will enable 276 homes across the district to be retrofitted with additional insulation, solar panels and air source heat pumps. Finally, I encourage all of us to look out for and give any practical support that some residents living in older and less well insulated houses might require, particularly to those in receipt of lump sum bills who heat their homes 'off grid' and to all those in need of assistance in way of benefit application form filling.

The Hundred Parishes

Until the 19th century, education in England was mostly linked to religious institutions or funded by wealthy donors. The Education Act of 1870 made a commitment to the provision of education to all on a national scale.

The Hundred Parishes has some fine examples of schools that were founded prior to this time and continue to educate young people today.

Felsted School was founded in 1564 by Richard Rich, the first Baron Rich. Under Henry VIII, he accumulated immense wealth whilst overseeing the dissolution of the monasteries, and he was later appointed Lord Chancellor of England under King Edward VI.

Dame Joyce Frankland, 1531-1588, lived at Rye House in Stanstead Abbotts, the wife of the lord of the manor. Her son was killed by a fall from his horse. In her will, Dame Joyce remembered him by providing funds for the education of boys at many locations including the "ffree grammar schole" in Newport, now The Joyce Frankland Academy.

St, Edmunds College in Standon parish is the oldest Catholic college in England. The main building dates from 1769. The school chapel is Grade I listed, built in the mid-19th century and designed by A.W.N. Pugin whose best-known work is the Elizabeth Tower, the clock tower of the Houses of Parliament.

Some schools built after 1870 have adopted the names of notable locals. For example Leventhorpe Academy in Sawbridgeworth was established in 1965 and named after the Leventhorpe family. Sir John Leventhorpe died in 1625 and has one of the finest memorials in Sawbridgeworth parish church.

Ralph Sadleir School in Standon was founded in 1971 and named after Sir Ralph who was born in 1507 and knighted in 1543 by Henry VIII. When Queen Mary I came to the throne, Sir Ralph retired to live quietly in Standon.

Managed Migration is the process by which people are being moved from legacy benefits across to Universal Credit. From the beginning of November, people who are currently claiming Employment Support Allowance (ESA) will start to receive migration notices, all of which are expected to be sent by the end of December 2025.
